Anti-Capitalist Education: Unpacking Capitalism in the Classroom

Youth are looking for alternatives! More recently, they have taken a prominent role in the various social justice movements arising in our times. In particular, we see our youth's desire for change through their leadership and participation in the global climate justice walk-outs initiated by high school students the past couple of years. Upon a multitude of different chants and slogans, a common one was "System Change, Not Climate Change." However, as educators, an important question to ask ourselves is whether it is possible to think of changing 'the system' without talking about capitalism and its role in some of the social issues we face today. It's time we put capitalism on trial by bringing it to the forefront of our curriculum. There are a variety of ways to get youth to think more critically about what capitalism simply is as an economic system, and then inquire into whether there are possible solutions and alternatives to alleviate some of the economic and social problems faced by many in our society. If we want to be educators that play a role in the transformation of the world, we shouldn't shy away from discussions around capitalism, including the discussions that challenge it.

This workshop will provide educators with tools, lessons and activities that can better explain our current capitalist system to youth in an accessible way. It will also provide educators with strategies on how to have discussions and critical dialogue about capitalism in our classrooms.
