Union Power: Organizing for Public Education

Teachers play a pivotal role not only in shaping young minds but also in advocating for systemic change. This workshop will equip educators with the tools and strategies needed to harness their collective strength and enact meaningful change in their schools, communities, and beyond. We will explore different models of unionism with a focus on shifting away from a business union model towards an organizing for power framework.
